SCHOOL & TOWN ELECTION DAY March 8th - 11 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Town & School Elections

Elections for Sullivan School Board members and Town officials will take place on Tuesday, March 8 from 11 am to 7 pm at the Town Hall. When you vote you will receive 2 separate ballots—one for town officers and one for school district officers. A complete list of those running for office follows inside.

Register to Vote

If you have not registered to vote, you may do so at the polls on March 8, with the Supervisors of the Checklist on Feb. 27 at the Town Hall between 11 and 11:30 am or with the Town Clerk **at least 10 days before the election**. You must be a registered voter to vote on warrant articles at the meetings on March 9. **Registrations will not be accepted on March 9.**

Absentee Ballots

Just a reminder - if you are worried that you won't be able to get in and vote, don't despair! Contact the Town Clerk's office to find out how you can vote by absentee ballot. Absentee ballots are available for both Town Elections and School Elections. Call 847-3316 or come in for an application.

Photo ID's

Please remember to bring your photo ID. A voter who does not have an approved photo ID may obtain a free photo ID for voting purposes only by presenting a voucher from their town/city clerk or the Secretary of State to any NH DMV office that issues identification.

The Town Clerk's Office will be closed on Election Day!

SCHOOL & TOWN MEETING March 9 - 7 p.m.

Voting on the school and town warrants will take place at the Town Hall Wednesday evening beginning at 7 pm. **You must be a registered voter to vote, either by hand, voice or ballot, at the town and school meetings. The last day to register for this will be March 8 at the polls.**

CELL TOWER PROPOSED FOR APPLE HILL

The Zoning Board of Adjustment recently received and accepted for review an application for a proposed cell tower on Apple Hill. The tower will consist of panel antennas mounted onto the top of a 195' tall monopole within a parcel of land (Map 6, Parcel 54) along Apple Hill Road. A public hearing will be held before any approval is given. The hearing is tentatively scheduled for early April. Contact Mary Hull or Kate Fuller in the town offices for more information.

Survey for Sullivan Outdoor Public Space Planning

Public space is the key to a town's "sense of place." Today, outdoor public space in our town's center is much less used than in the past, as illustrated in the 2015 Sullivan Master Plan: the former school yard is no longer available, and Jewett Park (a 3-acre park in the town's designated scenic area, created as part of the Sullivan Bicentennial celebration in 1987) has had limited maintenance recently and is rarely visited. In contrast, it was not so long ago that Sullivan was a much livelier place, with outdoor activities, such as concerts, often taking place in the town center for the enjoyment of the whole community.

To assess the current need for outdoor public space near the town center, a survey is being conducted by the planning board. If sufficient interest is expressed, a study may be undertaken by the town at a later date to assess the feasibility of renovating and improving access to outdoor public space to better meet the needs of Sullivan residents.

The brief survey for you to fill out will be available in the Sullivan Town Hall foyer on Town Election Day (March 8th). Please stop by. Your input is needed and much appreciated! If you can't make it on Election Day, surveys will be available from the Town Clerk until March 31st. Please turn your survey in to the planning board when completed.

We hope to publish the survey results in May. Stay tuned!

SPRING ROADSIDE CLEAN-UP & LUNCH!

This is a simple casserole I love to make on those days when you just don't know what to make.

My Hamburger Casserole

1 lb. ground beef	2 8 oz. cans tomato sauce
1 12 oz. bag egg noodles	1 small chopped green pepper
1 cup tomato ketchup	1 small chopped onion
salt & pepper to taste	American cheese to top

Heat oven to 350°. Brown ground beef in skillet, drain and add chopped green pepper and onion. Cook until pepper and onion are softened. Add tomato sauce and ketchup, salt and pepper to taste. Cook together for about 10 minutes. Boil egg noodles till just before al dente, drain. Put egg noodles and ground beef combo into a casserole dish, mix together. Cover casserole dish with foil and bake for 35 minutes. Uncover, top with American cheese, bake until cheese has melted. ENJOY!

Spring Hospice Volunteer Training

Hospice at HCS is offering a volunteer training program starting in March for those who are interested in becoming volunteers. The training will begin on March 29 and continues on Tuesday afternoons from 1:30 pm to 4:30 pm through May 17. (There will be no class on April 26.) Training will be held at the agency's Keene office at 312 Marlboro Street.

Volunteers are members of the hospice care team, providing support to the patient and to family members. After completing the training, volunteers assist hospice patients with interests such as writing letters, reading, playing board games, scrap booking, or they may accompany a patient to a community event or to visit friends; volunteers also provide respite to family members. Hospice volunteers are especially needed during the day, but time can be very flexible and work around employment and travel commitments.

The training program is offered free of charge, but class size is limited and pre-registration is required. To register, contact Lorraine Bishop, Hospice at HCS Volunteer Coordinator at 352-2253 or lbishop@HCSservices.org.

Hospice at HCS is a not-for-profit hospice with offices in Peterborough, Charlestown and in Keene at 312 Marlboro Street. Care is provided wherever a person calls home – their own home, or in an assisted living facility or nursing home.

Each year the Sullivan Church prepares different types of kits (school items, baby care supplies and hygiene items). 
