“LIBRARY FOOTNOTES”

We wish to begin our first library page with a thank you to all patrons for their patience and understanding with the two “newbies”. We are still on the learning curve as new situations arise, but we promise to try not to inconvenience you too much as we continue learning to meet the needs of our reading community. As a result of some intense training, we are happy to announce that the Inter-Library Loan system is now back on-line.

The **Second Saturday Book Group's** October discussion book was *Deadly Nightshade* by Cynthia Riggs. It's a ‘cozy’ little mystery that takes place on Martha's Vineyard. The book is the first in a series of novels written by a 90 year-old resident. The November book is *Maisie Dobbs* by Jacqueline Winspear. Our December book will be *Still Life* by Louise Penny, the first novel in the Inspector Gamache series.

The **Third Thursday Book Group's** September discussion book was *A Northern Light* by Jennifer Donnelly. It covers several genres: a good true crime story, blended with a little romance, rebellious teens coming of age mixed with a little history. One review calls it the “ultimate book club book.” The October discussion book was a classic, *The Mayor of Casterbridge* by Thomas Hardy. It's an enjoyable, complex tale of multiple lies, deceptions and betrayal. The book brought out the differences in the mind set of people in the late 1800's as compared to current philosophies. November's read is *The Invention of Wings* by Sue Monk Kidd, a story that takes place during the abolitionist and woman's suffrage movements. On the schedule for December is *Little Dorrit* by Charles Dickens. *North and South* by Elizabeth Gaskell will start off the new year in January.

Remember even if you cannot make the book group discussions, we have extra copies – please stop in and pick one up.

The **Genealogy Workshop** with the Jeffries will be starting again November 12th from 2 – 4 p.m.

“Sullivan Likes” – Adult reading suggestions from our patrons: James Patterson's Woman Murder Club Mysteries; *A Little Murder* part of the Angie Deacon series by Cindy Davis (NH author); *Naked Heat* by Richard Castle; Catherine Coulter's *A Brit in the FBI Series*; *Dead Wake* by Eric Larson. From the Archives

As many of you know, I will be appearing in a small role in the Edge Ensemble's production of Arthur Miller's *The Crucible* being presented on the second and third weekend in November. As a "local historian" I have had some interest in how Miller chose to bring historical facts and people into a fictional drama. As I researched my character, Giles Corey, I began to realize how thin the documentation was on the man. Basically, we know when he was baptized, a few legal issues he had and when he died. Most of the rest of what we know is inferential or anecdotal.

That has led me to one of those questions historian love to ask, "How do we know what we know?" On the surface it seems simple to answer. We know what documents (diaries, letters, wills, etc.) say, but what happens when there is nothing specific? This, in turn, leads me to one of the great mysteries of our town's history: what happened to Book 1 of the town records?

One of the treasures of the Sullivan Town Archives collection is the bound record book given to the town by General John Sullivan. The book contains the town clerk's records for the period between 1790 and 1832. This is often referred to as Book 2. However there was a Book 1 which covered the period when the town was being formed, the petition to incorporate and the town records between when it was incorporated in 1787 and the beginning of Book 2.

How do I know this? Josiah Seward's history of Sullivan has a section titled "Municipal Annals." He quotes from a record of town meetings, town elections and actions taken by the town meeting. The meetings were held at the home of James Rowe. His farm is marked by the cellar hole in the Winch Forest where the road to the Meeting House Rock turns sharply to the east. The record discusses the efforts to build a meeting house, which was finally accomplished in the meetings documented in Book 2. The last note from Book 1 was the receipt of the gift of the book from General Sullivan.

So, what happened to the earliest record of our town? New Hampshire State Law entrusts the town clerk with the custodianship of municipal records. We had a number of town clerks while Seward was researching the history and, apparently, they gave him full access to the record. Fortunately he recorded his research in detail. However, he offers no clue as to what happened to the original record. His papers and notes eventually found their way to the Historical Society of Cheshire County, but no Book 1 appears in the collection.

I like to believe (hope, really) that somehow the book (or a sheaf of papers looking like a book) ended up in an attic someplace and sometime it will reappear. In the meantime, our earliest record remains an unsolved mystery.

SULLIVAN PLANNING BOARD UPDATE

Planning Board Chairman Leslie Casey and Secretary Ann Sweet reported on Sullivan Centre Street's very poor condition at the September 14th meeting of the Transportation Advisory Committee of the Regional Planning Commission. State Tier 4 roads in the region are almost all shown to be in less than fair to very poor condition and solutions are hard to come by, given the shrinkage of federal and state funding for roads. There was one piece of good news: funding for repair of Route 9 between the Country Store and the Roxbury line has increased, so a higher-level renovation is promised than had been originally reported.

As part of continuing education for the Planning Board, Casey and Sweet attended a very informative municipal law lecture series held by the NH Municipal Association on the topics of treatment of non-conforming "grandfathered" lots, rules governing agricultural land uses (mostly permissive and encouraging) and the importance of enforcement of building and fire codes.

Chairman Casey also attended a recent conference held in Peterborough on strong towns. She learned that creating a "sense of place," and local responsibility for the continued prosperity of towns like ours are vital. Sullivan is a wonderful town, yet having given up its school and police department and with crumbling state-maintained roads impeding travel, "Sullivan needs a reason to exist," said Casey.

Dorothy and Peter Miles were present at the October Planning Board meeting as observers, considering membership on the board. A request for their appointment as member and alternate will be presented to the Selectmen for their approval. We are very grateful to the Miles for volunteering, and look forward to having them join us!

Apple Cake

2 cups flour	1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. baking powder	1 cup sugar
8 T. softened butter/margarine	2 eggs
1 tsp, vanilla	4-6 apples (peeled, cored & sliced)

4 T. softened butter
4 tsp. cinnamon

Topping for Cake
6 T. sugar

Combine flour, salt and baking powder, set aside. Mix butter, sugar, eggs and vanilla until smooth. Combine with dry ingredients, a little milk can be added if too dry. Drop by spoon onto greased and floured cookie pan. Spread dough out to cover pan. Place apples in dough in parallel lines. Sprinkle topping over apples. Bake 350 degrees for 35 mins. ENJOY!

**Pumpkin and other custard-style pies are done when they jiggle slightly in the middle. Fruit pies are done when the pastry is golden, juices bubble, and fruit is tender*

The Sullivan School Board continues to meet once per month (typically the 3rd Wednesday of the month at 6:30 or 7 pm - the times have varied - please look for postings to confirm date and time). We meet in the lower town hall. Families and residents are invited to attend any of our meetings to discuss any school district related matters.

How far we have come: From time to time it's important to look back to see how far we have come. We are in our 3rd year as an independent school district and SAU 96. Our student population is ever changing and the school board continues to monitor these changes as we prepare our budget once again for next year. Much positive feedback has come from several families with students K-6 at Nelson Elementary and 7-12 at KMS/KHS.

One year ago we were anticipating closing on the sale of the former Sullivan school building. We have successfully done so and continue to pay down the remaining balance as we incurred some withdrawal costs. This included reimbursing MRSD the cost of prior improvements on the building while we were in the cooperative school district. It remains a goal of the district to reduce this liability as soon as possible. The Sullivan School District's school board would like to thank the members of the district in this continued effort as we all feel it is time to put this loan behind us. We will do so while keeping in mind the needs of our taxpayers.

The late bus travels to Nelson 1-2x/week and we may be able to arrange shared use with a commitment from the student/family to ride the bus if it is arranged.

* Keene High School: Sullivan students 9-12th graders

Sullivan withdrew from the Monadnock Regional School District approx. 3 years ago and formed the Sullivan School District and SAU #96.

Post-withdrawal from the Monadnock Regional School District, some high school students from Sullivan were grandfathered and allowed to finish out their high school career at MRHS. Currently we have less than a handful of 12th graders remaining at MRHS.

In order to register your child(ren) for the public school listed above, you must be a resident of Sullivan and you must establish residency through our district/town clerk, Mary Hull, prior to enrollment.

If you have a shared guardianship agreement/custody agreement, you will need to provide a copy to Mary Hull at the town hall in Sullivan, or mail directly to Sullivan School District, PO Box 111, Sullivan, NH 03445 as you register for school.

Anyone moving OUT of town must notify the school board chair, Stephanie Kleine at 603-209-4151 or Mary Hull, district clerk, of the move if you have children in the school system. This is also required if you have a child currently attending KMS or KHS and are moving to Keene or another town that sends their students to Keene so that the appropriate town can be fiscally aware of where that child resides.

Homeschooling families- Even if your children are homeschooled, it is required that you send a letter to the Sullivan School District Superintendent, Ken Dassau, to inform the District that your children are being homeschooled. If you have never done this and are homeschooling in Sullivan, please mail your letter to Ken Dassau at PO Box 111, Sullivan, NH 03445. Exciting things are happening at the Sullivan Congregational Church! The sanctuary is undergoing renovations, which includes the removal of three front rows of pews, so that there is more open space in the front. This change provides a more welcoming venue for church services, weddings, musical and other performances. 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
