FALL FUN IN NH

Corn Mazes

How do they create them? (answer courtesy of Moulton Farm's website)

- The corn maze is planted around mid-June every year depending on the weather. It takes about 6 hours to plant.
- The field is planted in both directions to create a grid.
- An outline of the field is drawn on about 20 pieces of graph paper taped together. Each line on the graph paper represents 1 row of corn.
- The maze is then designed by hand. This process alone takes one or two days and several erasers.
- When the corn is about a foot tall, the giant graph paper map is very carefully followed and the paths are cut out using a trimmer. A lot of counting and re-counting is involved. The job takes a team of two or three people about two days to complete.
- After the paths are cut, a small tractor and rotary tiller are sent through the maze to make sure the paths have no corn in them. This often takes a full day to complete.
- The paths are then compacted and the rocks are removed in order to make the terrain as safe as possible for explorers.
- As the corn grows, we strip the leaves off the stalks that line the paths to make it easier to see and safer to travel.
- By the time the maze opens, the corn in the maze can be up to 15 feet tall.
- We use a feed corn to grow the maze. It is edible, but humans don't find it very enjoyable.

Changes to the Library

This is not something that is unique to Sullivan. Across the country libraries are restructuring and in some cases closing because of lack of patronage. The internet continues to grow in power and content. Movie collections can be streamed. Books are increasingly available online—in some cases for free. The two income family means that parents are hard-put to add a trip to the library to their busy schedule.

This puts the library trustees in a dilemma. What should the nature of library services be in Sullivan? If very few people are using the library, then why should it stay open? Are changes needed in the service we provide? Should we begin looking at the library building as a community center rather than strictly a library?

The community has made a significant investment in the building beginning with the addition in 1998. Recently we have replaced the sills, replaced the clapboards, insulated the windows, reinsulated the ceiling area and this fall the Friends of the Library will be adding insulated curtains. All of this has made the building more usable and efficient. However, what is its future use?

What are your ideas?

All of these questions and more will be discussed in a series of public forums with the library trustees. It is important that we hear from a large group of interested citizens. All forums will be held at the library. Please plan to attend one or all of them and bring your ideas.

Scientific Breakthrough in ALS Research Made!

Last summer Mary Hull had an idea – why not have a Sullivan Ice Bucket Challenge to honor one of our own? Ellen Corindia has had ALS for many years and, since being diagnosed, has spent most of her waking hours educating people about the disease and fundraising for research. Townspeople, friends and family turned out on the sunny but chilly September day to have the icy water dumped on them.

A new study published by Johns Hopkins researchers in *Science Journal* last week credits the Ice Bucket Challenge with helping them to unravel the mystery behind a protein called TDP-43, which in more than 90% of ALS cases is dysfunctional.

"For the past decade we've been trying to figure out exactly what it is doing, and now I think we have finally figured it out," Jonathan Ling, of Johns Hopkins Medicine, said in a You Tube video explaining the university's latest breakthrough. "The best part is it can be fixed, so with any luck this could lead to the possibility of a cure or at least a slowing down of this terrible disease," he continues.

"The money came at a critical time when we needed it," Professor Philip Wong added. However, they warned that the work was ongoing and many current ALS sufferers would not necessarily see the benefits of the research.

In the US, the ALS Association which represents people with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (also known as Lou Gehrig's disease) and all motor neurone disorders - received \$115m in donations during the months of August and September, when the challenge was at its peak. The American charity says the money helped triple the amount it spends on research every year. Up to 15,000 people in the US are reported to be suffering from ALS.

HCS Offers Flu Clinics

Home Healthcare, Hospice and Community Services (HCS) will hold flu immunization clinics in the Sullivan area this fall. A clinic will be held at the **Keene Senior Center** at 70 Court Street on Tuesday, September 15 from 9:30am-10:30am and at the **Nelson Town Hall** on Tuesday, September 22 from 11:30am-1:00pm.

A new 4-strain vaccine will be administered by HCS Wellness Nurses, aiming to provide broader protection against the four major strains of circulating flu viruses that are expected this season. This 4-strain flu vaccine is available for the first time this season. It is important to get a flu shot every year because the viruses that circulate may vary each season and protection from vaccination declines over time.

These clinics are open to the public ages 19 years or older. No appointment is needed. People are encouraged to wear loose sleeves. Medicare, Anthem BCBS, Harvard Pilgrim and MVP insurances will be accepted, or there is a \$33 fee for the vaccine.

UPDATE ON TOWN HALL ENERGY UPGRADES

On August 3, the Sullivan Energy Committee reported to the Sullivan Selectmen on their recommendations for energy upgrades following the energy audit conducted on the town hall in the spring. The first priority, according to the committee, is to improve the heat-conserving ability of the building's envelope, such as air sealing in various places. The committee presented a contractor's estimate for those improvements. The second priority is improving the heating

system, for which a heating expert's proposal was presented. How to pay for these upgrades, which will save money in the long run but require expenditures in the short run, is being considered by the selectmen.

FROM THE PLANNING BOARD

Centre St. Concerns

NH DOT District 4 Engineer John Kallfelz, P.E., provided the town with an update on the state's plans for maintenance of Centre St., at a special meeting of the Sullivan planning board that took place on August 26th at the Town Hall. We learned that repaving of Centre St. is scheduled for 2017. The last time the road was paved was 2006. Mr. Kallfelz acknowledged that what the road really needs is rebuilding in several areas, but the cost would be many times over what the budget allows. Furthermore, Sullivan Center Rd./Centre St. is classified as a Tier 4 road by the state and is therefore low-priority. The planning board will continue talking with the NH DOT and with the regional planning commission to try to encourage more state investment in this highway that is so vital for our town.

Recipe Corner & Helpful Hints with Ginni McByrne

I want to thank Lorraine Lindamood for sharing this recipe. It's a great cake recipe for those hot days when you don't want to put the oven on. And I think we all know that there will still be some hot days coming. Sounds yummy, can't wait to try it!

Cherry topped Refrigerator Cake

1 box graham crackers	2 cups milk
1 pkg vanilla instant pudding	(6 servings or 2 smaller pkgs)
2 cups Cool Whip	2 cans (21 oz ea) cherry pie filling

Line a 13"x9" pan with graham crackers (whole) break some to fill in where the larger ones left an open spot. Pour cold milk into a bowl and add the pudding mix. With an electric mixer on low speed, blend well. Let stand 5 minutes then blend in Cool Whip. Spread ½ mixture over the graham crackers. Add another layer of graham crackers and top with remaining pudding mixture. Add one more layer of graham crackers and spread cherry filling over the crackers. Chill overnight. ENJOY!

*****HELPFUL HINT*****

To tell how old an egg is, place the egg in a pan of cold water. If it lies on its side, it is fresh – if it tilts on an angle, its approximately 3-4 days old – if an egg stands upright, it is probably about 10 days old. If an egg floats to the top, it is old and should not be used.

The Sullivan School Board meets on the third Wednesday of every month at 6:30pm in the lower town hall. Topics of discussion include a report from Ken Dassau, our superintendent, reports from our district treasurer, Toni Ellsworth and occasional updates from our town clerk, Mary Hull. Our business manager, Brian Gallagher, assisted us recently as we prepared for our second school year-end audit.

The audit review of the Sullivan School District year ending June 2015 was conducted on July 23rd by the accounting firm of Vachon and Clukay. As a result, the district requested a transfer of \$85,000 from the district's Tuition Reserve to the school district.

As we enter our third school year as an independent district, we would like to **THANK** each of the individuals listed above as well as the Sullivan Selectmen, budget committee and trustees for their hard work, and dedication to the Sullivan School District.

The Sullivan School Board looks forward to serving our district for another school year!

Bus Schedule: By the time this newsletter will be printed and distributed, bus routes will already be published in *The Keene Sentinel* and available to families through the school board and the schools. If you have any changes to discuss concerning the bus route, please contact First Student directly **AND** notify the school.

Where Sullivan Students attend school: Nelson School is the elementary school for Sullivan students attending public school K-6th grade. Sullivan students 7-8th attend the Keene Middle School and students 9-12th attend Keene High School.

In order **to register**, you must be a resident of Sullivan and you must establish residency through our district/town clerk, Mary Hull prior to enrollment.

If you have a shared guardianship agreement/custody agreement, you will need to provide a copy to Mary Hull at the town hall in Sullivan or mail it directly to Sullivan School District, PO Box 111, Sullivan, NH 03445 as you register for school.

If you have children in the school system and are moving OUT of town, you must notify the school board chair, Stephanie Kleine at 603-209-4151 or Mary Hull, district clerk, of the move, if you have children in the school system. This is also required if you have a child currently attending KMS or KHS and are moving to Keene so the appropriate town can be fiscally aware of where that child resides.

Homeschooling families- Even if your children are homeschooled, it is required that you send a letter to the Sullivan School District Superintendent, Ken Dassau, to inform the District that your children are being homeschooled. If you have never done this and are homeschooling in Sullivan, please mail your letter to Ken Dassau at PO Box 111, Sullivan, NH 03445.
