The Town Clerk's office will be closed on Election Days.

From the Archives

The lack of original documents is a source of frustration when one is researching Sullivan's history. This is especially true of the history of organizations. While we have papers regarding (among others) the Honor Bright Grange, the Willing Workers, and the Sullivan Improvement Society, many records have been lost over the years. It is good that Rev. J.L. Seward wrote down a lot of critical information which made its way into his Sullivan history. However, Seward is only a "secondary" source and not the "primary" or original source. While Seward often faithfully recorded what he found, it would still be nice to have the original source material.

This came to my attention when I stumbled upon a letter written to Rev. Seward in 1906 by Clara A. (Spaulding) Barrett. It was in a collection of unrelated material I was processing for the Historical Society of Cheshire County. How it got there is anybody's guess. Clara Barret was the wife of Marshall Barrett and lived on a farm at the end of Jenkins Lane. She had in her possession the records of the Sullivan Female Circle of Industry, and she was writing to Seward to detail the work of the group—especially during the Civil War.

From Seward's history we know that the Circle was a women's group affiliated with the Congregational Church in Sullivan Center. They engaged in charitable work and raising funds to support the church's work. As the Civil War got underway, the group began making "comforts" for the Union Soldiers. They also began admitting men to help in their work and raised money. In 1862, the group voted to change the name to the Sullivan Soldier's Aid Society. Seward also records some of the things the group made and shipped to the soldiers. After the war, the group raised the money and oversaw the construction of our Civil War Monument. Finally, Seward provides us with a list of some of things the group made for the soldiers and notes that they also raised \$553 during the course of the war.

In reading Clara Barrett's letter we find some details that Seward left out. For example, the letter notes that the group was divided into smaller groups that corresponded to the school districts. This makes sense since transportation to the Center was limited in those days. The members would meet in a more convenient farm in the "neighborhood" to do their work. Barrett also notes that the record states that the society changed its name in 1863, not 1862. She also notes that the original membership of the group when it was constituted in 1840 was 64 and not 82 as noted in the Seward History.

However there is complete agreement on the numbers of articles shipped to the Union forces. These include knitting 572 pairs of stockings and 41 pairs of mittens; 59 quilts and blankets; and 130 sheets. Sometimes Seward consolidated items as in "146 flannel and cotton shirts" (77 flannel shirts and 69 cotton shirts, according to Barrett) and "310 towels and handkerchiefs" (137 Towels, 173 handkerchiefs). Seward also notes large quantities of fruits. Barrett lists the specific amounts, 51 bottles and 4 jugs of wines and cordials, 69 lbs. of dried apples, 2 lbs. of dried cherries and 4 jars of blackberry jam. Also of note is the use of money raised. While some of it went for materials, the letter notes a list of things that were probably purchased in dry goods stores. These include spencers (a kind of jacket), fans, lemons, spices, tin cups, envelopes, pens, writing paper, soap, books, magazines and newspapers. Also noted were materials for bandages such as lint, cotton and linen pieces and cotton batting.

None of this takes away from the research done by Seward and doesn't change the fact of the great amount of work done by the society during the Civil War. As Seward concludes, "This is certainly an honorable record and, in proportion to the number women in the town, it may safely be assumed that it was not surpassed by the similar work of women in any town in the country."

Still it would be helpful to have the record book referenced in Clara Barrett's letter. It, along with the "Town Record Book #1," the original road layout documents and the vital statistics prior to 1870 have been lost and will probably never be recovered. For those pieces we have to go to the town history.

Nelson Elementary News - Aug. 2018

NES continues to change with all the construction lasting through the summer. The entry ramp has recently been removed and the replacement is in the process of being built. The steepness of the ramp was not in compliance with ADA requirements which prompted the work. The parking lot has had the asphalt base coat installed and we are awaiting the completion of the entry ramp and stairs before the "finish" or "wear" coat is applied. We have settled nicely into our new addition and enjoying the added space. We still have a few minor things to finish up, but the school is looking great and will serve our children for years to come!

We have had a few staffing changes from this past year. Below is the letter that parents will be receiving about changes and additions to our Nelson staff:

Dear Nelson Elementary School Parents,

I am writing to provide families with important information regarding our staffing and teacher assignments for the 2018-2019 school year. Below is the most current enrollment numbers for next year. Typically, we have a few students move into the area during the summer months so those number could change slightly.

K/R - 17, Grade 1 - 11 , Grade 2- 15, Grade 3 - 8, Grade 4 - 13, and Grade 5 - 12

Teacher assignments for next school year are as follows: Mrs. Benner will continue to teach the K/R class. We have hired a new Grade 1 teacher, Alyssa Ehrentreu. She is from Connecticut and has some experience working in the lower elementary grades. Ms. Fortier will step up to Grade 2 with her current students as will Mrs. Roach who will teach a combined Grade 3 and Grade 4 class. Mrs. Whippie Prior will be the Grade 5 teacher. Realizing that Mrs. Roach's class is large, we are planning on a classroom tutor to be dedicated to working in her classroom. Two other tutors will divide their day to support the other four classes. Despite my efforts to convince her otherwise, Mrs. Dubriske has chosen to retire completely from teaching after this school year. Additionally, Mr. Albertson has decided to make a career change and Ms. McLean has accepted a full time position in a neighboring district as their Art teacher. We have completed an extensive search and interview process to fill all of these vacancies. We are excited about the new staff that will be joining our teaching staff. Mrs. Colleen Hartman will be our Music teacher. She is from West Chesterfield and also teaches at Trinity Christian School in Keene. Mr. Leo Echavarría, Physical Education, has been teaching at Franklin Elementary in Keene the past few years. Teaching Art for us will be Ms. Yumiko Sandoe. She is bringing her experience from several other positions to Nelson. Mr. Richard Hoffman will take over our custodial duties as well. We are fortunate to have all of these people join our staff.

I want to thank the communities of Nelson and Sullivan for their continued support of our school. This past year has seen much change but our core values and belief have remained constant. Keeping the valued traditions that make us such a special school is something we all feel strongly about preserving. School will begin on Wednesday, 8/29 at 8:00 am. We've scheduled our Open House for Thursday, Sept. 13th at 6:00 pm at which time you will be able to meet the new staff.

Jalapeno Bites

- 1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened
- 8 oz. Parmesan cheese, grated
- 4 tablespoons jalapeno peppers, seeded and chopped
- 1 large egg
- 2 cups bread crumbs (add more if needed).

Preheat oven to 350 degrees

Mix cream cheese, Parmesan cheese, jalapenos, and the egg. Mix to the consistency to shape into balls. Form balls using about 1/2 tablespoon. Roll balls in the bread crumbs. Place on an ungreased baking sheet. Bake for 10 to 15 minutes, until they are golden brown. Serve warm. Makes about a dozen.

The Sullivan Congregational Church is pleased to have been able to help. On very short notice they got 3 good-sized boxes of supplies together and delivered them. WORDS FROM A CVTC DRIVER

CVTC’s Volunteer Drivers provide “no fee” transportation for people who do not have access to transportation because of age or other limiting circumstances. Our trip purposes include non-emergency medical, social service appointments and trips to the grocery store and pharmacy.

Our CVTC Volunteer Driver, Terry, says:

“About two years ago our small town newsletter ran an ad looking for Volunteer Drivers. Since then, my husband and I have been active participants in the CVTC program. Being retired and having the freedom to “go & do” on our own schedules, we were initially hesitant to sign up, fearful of getting locked into a schedule of some kind.

We did our “due diligence,” learning that the selection of days and times were at our discretion. The fear of commitment evaporated. There’s an impressive computer system allowing volunteers to easily search and assign themselves for riders in need. After the trip has been concluded, it’s simple to record time spent and mileage for reimbursement

This program not only helps our riders in getting to appointments, but it has enhanced our retirement existentially. We feel needed, appreciated and there’s a reason for being here. In some instances we’ve encountered riders who have little social interaction outside of their trips to hospitals and doctors. Our trips in these cases have reflected rejuvenation for both rider and driver. Our riders have been diverse, fascinating and most appreciative of CVTC’s services. We cheerfully look forward to continuing assisting those we’ve met to date and anticipate meeting new riders as our schedules allow.

Try putting yourself into the positions our riders are experiencing: losing their independence and ability to drive; dependency on others. You’ll find as a driver that you’ll get more out of the ride than your rider will.”

Hospice at HCS is offering a volunteer training program for those who are interested in becoming volunteers. The training will begin on September 26 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. and will continue Wednesday mornings through November 7. Training will be held at the agency's Keene office at 312 Marlboro Street.

Volunteers are members of the hospice care team, providing support to the patient and to family members. After completing the training, volunteers assist hospice patients with interests such as writing letters, reading, playing board games, scrap booking, or may accompany a patient to a community event or to visit friends; volunteers also provide respite to family members. Hospice volunteers are especially needed during the day, but scheduling can be very flexible and worked around employment and travel commitments.
